Art

- The student learned about colors and textures through creating their own visual representation of the ingredients in the Wombat stew
- They practiced fine motor skills while cutting, pasting, and arranging their artwork
- Exposure to different art materials helped develop creativity and imagination

English

- The activity promoted language development as the child engaged in storytelling about the Wombat stew
- They learned new vocabulary related to the ingredients and the actions involved in making the stew
- Listening and speaking skills were enhanced through discussions about the story and the characters

Music

- The student explored rhythm and beats through creating sound effects for the story using simple instruments or body percussion
- They practiced memory and sequencing by singing the Wombat Stew song and repeating the various ingredients
- Exposure to different sounds and tones helped develop auditory discrimination skills

Science

- The activity introduced the concept of mixing and understanding cause and effect through the creation of the imaginary Wombat stew

- Enabling them to identify and differentiate between different ingredients of the stew helped improve their categorization skills
