Social

- The 1-year-old student learned the concept of turn-taking by passing the toy back and forth with a peer, understanding the importance of sharing and waiting for their chance to play.
- Through this activity, the child practiced non-verbal communication skills, such as eye contact and gestures, to signal their readiness to receive or pass the toy, enhancing their social interaction abilities.
- Participating in passing the toy helped the student develop empathy as they were able to observe their peer's reactions and adjust their actions accordingly, fostering emotional understanding and connection.

For continued development, encourage the 1-year-old to engage in more interactive games that involve sharing and taking turns to further enhance their social skills. You can introduce activities that require cooperation, such as building blocks together or playing simple board games that involve sharing pieces.
