# **Core Skills Analysis**

## Mathematics

- The child practiced measuring ingredients such as flour and milk, enhancing their understanding of volume and quantity.
- They developed skills in basic counting while adding eggs and measuring scoops of batter.
- The activity helped introduce concepts of fractions by discussing half a cup versus a full cup of ingredients.
- The process of flipping pancakes allowed the child to grasp the idea of symmetry and equal parts.

## Science

- The child observed the chemical reactions that occur when baking powder is mixed into the batter and heated on the stove.
- They learned about heat transfer as they watched the pancake cook and change color.
- The activity presented an opportunity to discuss the states of matter (liquid batter to solid pancake).

- The child took part in a collaborative cooking effort, learning the value of teamwork.
- They practiced sharing roles, such as mixing and flipping, which fostered communication and cooperation.
- Engaging in this activity promotes patience and taking turns, essential social skills.
- The child expressed preferences and opinions about flavors and presentations, reinforcing selfexpression.

## Tips

To enhance their pancake-making experience, the child can explore different flavors by adding fruits or spices, encouraging creativity. They can also learn about the origins of pancakes from different cultures, enriching their knowledge of global cuisine. Encouraging them to help with the cleanup afterward can teach responsibility and the importance of taking care of shared spaces.
