## **Core Skills Analysis**

### Geography

- The student learned about different countries and their geographical locations by engaging with the concept of a passport office, identifying where various passports originate.

# **Tips**

To further enhance the learning experience, I suggest incorporating discussions around how passports are issued in different countries and the implications of having or not having one. Additionally, setting up a mock passport office in a classroom might encourage role-play activities that reinforce the concepts of geography and civics. Encourage the student to research a country they are interested in visiting, exploring cultural, geographic, and governmental aspects. Also, consider connecting mathematical skills by calculating travel expenses or time differences based on their chosen destination.
