

## Core Skills Analysis

### Environmental Science

- Rubie demonstrated an understanding of animal habitats by identifying different animals and their natural environments observed in the show.

### Social Studies

- She recognized cultural elements present in the storyline, such as how different communities respect and interact with nature, enhancing her awareness of diverse perspectives.
- The narrative prompted discussions about local wildlife in her own community, fostering a connection between the content of the show and her immediate environment.

### Language Arts

- Rubie engaged in active listening during the show, enhancing her comprehension skills as she followed along with the storyline and characters.
- She practiced expressive language by retelling parts of the story, which developed her narrative skills and sequencing abilities.
- The program introduced new vocabulary and phrases associated with wildlife, which Rubie was able to incorporate into her speech during discussions afterward.
- Her ability to ask questions about the content displayed her critical thinking and curiosity, key components for developing literacy skills.

Crafting sessions where she can create animal masks or habitats can also reinforce her learning while allowing for creativity. Lastly, both reading books related to wildlife and visiting local zoos or parks can further immerse her in these concepts.
