

## Core Skills Analysis

### Literacy and Language Arts

- Students practice letter recognition by identifying individual letters of their names to write on each egg.
- The activity supports early writing skills by encouraging students to write letters clearly on a small, shaped surface.
- It enhances spelling skills as students recall the exact sequence of letters in their names.
- It promotes fine motor coordination necessary for writing and manipulating paper cut-outs.

### Art and Creativity

- Coloring the eggs allows students to explore color recognition and practice controlled coloring skills.
- Cutting out eggs develops fine motor skills through handling scissors and precision in cutting along lines.
- Students engage in creative expression while choosing colors and decorating their eggs individually.
- This hands-on activity reinforces spatial awareness as students work within defined shapes.

### Cognitive Development

- The sequencing of colors and letters promotes memory and cognitive processing.
- Writing individual letters on eggs enhances pattern recognition and helps with understanding order in names.
- Following multiple-step instructions (color, cut, write) builds executive functioning and task management.
- Personalizing each egg with letters of their name fosters identity awareness and self-expression.

### Tips

To deepen learning, encourage students to narrate the colors they choose and explain why. Introduce letter sounds along with letter writing to strengthen phonemic awareness. To improve fine motor skills, offer varied cutting exercises using different shapes and sizes of paper before progressing to name-writing on eggs. Additional activities could include sorting eggs by color, creating simple words from the letters on the eggs, or matching uppercase and lowercase letters. Incorporating storytelling about eggs or names can further expand literacy skills while making the activity more engaging.
