Tips

To deepen Rubie's outdoor learning experience, introduce themed chalk drawing challenges such as drawing letters, shapes, or hopscotch grids to blend creativity with early literacy and numeracy. Incorporate science exploration by observing what makes bubbles stronger or cause them to pop quickly, perhaps experimenting with different bubble solutions. Encourage Rubie to narrate a story about her chalk drawings or the bubbles as she plays, fostering language skills. You can also invite peers or family members to join for collaborative chalk murals or bubble chasing games to support social learning.
