

Core Skills Analysis

Mandarin

- The student learned how to ask and answer questions about the current date and day in Mandarin, such as 今天是什么日期? (What is today's date?) and 今天是什么日子? (What day is today?).
- The student practiced using vocabulary related to birthdays and dates, including understanding how to say '25 June is Xueli's birthday' and asking which day of the week a specific date falls on.
- The student acquired a set of key time-related vocabulary terms for days (e.g., 周一, 周二, 周三, 周四, 周五, 周六, 周日), years (e.g., 2023, 2024, 2025), months (e.g., 一月, 二月, 三月), and weeks (e.g., 第一周, 第二周, 第三周), enhancing their temporal understanding and sequencing skills in Mandarin.
- The activity integrated date, weekday, and birthday-related dialogues, allowing the student to practice real-life conversational Chinese about time and calendar events.

Tips

To deepen the student's understanding of Mandarin time vocabulary, try integrating real-life calendar activities such as marking family birthdays or local holidays on a Mandarin-labeled calendar. Encourage the student to create short diary entries or daily schedules in Mandarin that mention dates, days, and special occasions using the newly learned vocabulary. Another engaging extension is to have the student interview family members or friends about their birthdays and favorite months, practicing both question and answer structures. Finally, introducing Mandarin songs or poems related to days and months can help reinforce memorization with rhythm and melody.
