Arts and Theatre Studies

- Cameron learned how ballet performances use visual elements like costumes and colours to convey character traits and narrative groups effectively.
- She was introduced to the concept of symbolism in the arts, noticing how colour choices communicate themes such as good versus evil and social roles within the story.
- By discussing the merging of colours (purple) to depict unity between characters, Cameron gained insight into how artistic techniques enhance storytelling in performing arts.
- Cameron developed an appreciation for ballet despite initial reluctance, showing openness to new art forms and experiences.

Critical Thinking and Social Awareness

- Cameron reflected critically on the association of 'black' with evil in the production and identified how such symbolism could have negative social implications, such as reinforcing racial stereotypes.
- She demonstrated an ability to question and analyse cultural messages embedded within artistic works.
- This activity fostered her awareness of potential biases in storytelling and encouraged empathy and thoughtful observation about social justice.
- She engaged actively in a dialogue about the ethics of symbolic representation, which enhances moral reasoning skills.

Tips

To build on Cameron's interest and emerging critical thinking, consider exploring other performances or stories that use symbolism, comparing how different cultures or authors represent themes like good and evil. Engage Cameron in creating her own artwork or stories using colour symbolism to express ideas or emotions, helping her to internalize these concepts creatively. It would also be valuable to discuss the historical context and evolving meanings of colours and symbols in various societies to develop a deeper cultural understanding. Finally, encourage reflective conversations after performances or books that address sensitive social topics, bolstering empathy and nuanced thinking.
