

Core Skills Analysis

Physical Development

- Griffin practiced gross motor skills by climbing the climbing frame, enhancing his muscle strength and coordination.
- Throwing balls and bean bags through the Easter target helped develop hand-eye coordination and aim.
- Engaging with stacking toys supported fine motor skills and precision in finger movements.

Cognitive Development

- Building and destroying with Duplo blocks encouraged problem-solving and understanding of cause and effect.
- Sorting toys promoted early categorization and classification skills.
- Exploring different sensory mats provided sensory input that aids in cognitive processing and awareness.

Language and Communication

- Babbling to himself indicates early stages of language development and self-expression.
- Imitating others by throwing objects through the target demonstrates social learning and observational skills.

Social and Emotional Development

- Copying others shows social engagement and desire to participate in group activities.
- Exploring favourite areas suggests a sense of security and comfort in his environment.

Tips

To further enrich Griffin's physical development, incorporate outdoor obstacle courses or safe climbing activities that challenge his balance and coordination. For cognitive growth, introduce simple sorting games with everyday objects or sensory bins that invite exploration of textures and shapes. To nurture language skills, encourage turn-taking babble games or read interactive picture books emphasizing new sounds and words. Socially, create small-group play sessions where Griffin can observe and mimic peers in a supportive setting, helping to build his confidence and collaborative skills.
