Tips

To deepen understanding, encourage the student to think about the importance of test messages in real life, such as safety drills. Have them create their own announcement scripts and practice clear, calm delivery. Integrate discussions about situations where 'this is just a test' messages are used (fire drills, emergency broadcasts) to increase awareness of preparedness. Additionally, explore how different tones and repetitions influence listener reactions and comprehension.
