Tips

Experiment with glazing and firing processes, perhaps through supervised workshops or demonstrations, to connect the hands-on clay work with the science of ceramics. Integrate storytelling by prompting the student to create pottery pieces that represent characters or themes from their favorite books or personal experiences, expanding narrative thinking alongside artistic creation.
