### Art & Creativity

- Developed curiosity about natural processes like evaporation or rain wash-away.

### Tips

To deepen the understanding and enjoyment of outdoor chalk activities, encourage the child to experiment with creating patterns or shapes that follow natural forms they observe such as leaves or clouds. Introduce simple geometry concepts by drawing shapes and naming them during play. Invite them to document their creations by photographing them before the chalk art fades, creating a temporary gallery of their work over time. You might also incorporate storytelling by asking the child to describe the scene or characters in their chalk drawings, supporting language and narrative development while outdoors.
