Tips

To deepen the learning from playing and caring for baby dolls, encourage your child to create a daily care schedule for their doll, helping develop planning and time management. Introduce simple story-building by asking your child to narrate what the doll 'did' during the day, fostering language and sequencing skills. Incorporate real-life connections by discussing how and why people care for babies, highlighting different family roles and cultures. To boost fine motor skills further, set up activities that involve buttoning, zipping, or tying doll clothes, turning care into an engaging hands-on experience.
