

## Core Skills Analysis

You can create a story map or make a booklet detailing the steps of borrowing books. Engage in role play to practice library etiquette like speaking softly and returning books on time. Extend learning by organizing a mini-library at home where the child can categorize books, lending them to family members and tracking returns, reinforcing organizational and responsibility skills.
