Tips

To deepen Alexandra's understanding and engagement with dinosaurs and prehistoric worlds, encourage her to research and draw specific dinosaurs she likes, then label their names and traits. Another extension is to build dioramas using natural materials like leaves and stones to recreate realistic dinosaur habitats. Storytelling can be enhanced by prompting Alexandra to write or narrate a day in the life of a dinosaur from her world, fostering literacy and sequencing skills. Additionally, exploring fossils through simple hands-on activities, like making fossil imprints with clay, can connect imaginative play with real-world paleontology concepts.
