Tips

To deepen understanding of ghost towns, encourage J to research the specific history of the town visited, including why it was founded and why it was abandoned. Creating a photo journal or sketchbook of the site can help capture observations and prompt reflection on change over time. Another idea is to map the ghost town's layout compared to a modern town, exploring how design and infrastructure evolved. Introducing storytelling by imagining life of past residents through creative writing or role-play can bring history to life. Finally, comparing ghost towns in different regions can highlight factors that differently impact community survival.
