# **Core Skills Analysis**

#### Social Studies

### Tips

To deepen understanding of social studies concepts from this activity, consider engaging the child in creating a detailed map of the family land that includes the property line, natural landmarks, and historical sites like the old buildings. This promotes spatial awareness and geographical skills. Additionally, explore the history of the land by researching when and why the buildings were constructed and who lived there, anchoring personal experiences in broader historical contexts. Encourage discussions about property rights and the importance of natural habitats to develop environmental stewardship and civic responsibility. Finally, involve the child in a local nature journal to document flora and fauna, connecting ecology with the community and its history.
