You might introduce simple nature journaling where he can draw or paste collected natural items like leaves or bark to explore textures and shapes further. Planning repeat walks to the same area across different seasons will highlight environmental changes and promote scientific observation. Finally, fostering conversations about safety in outdoor play will help him develop critical thinking about risks and personal limits.
