Tips

Facilitate discussions or debates on whether human actions are predetermined or self-directed, using examples from both Shakespeare and contemporary stories. Incorporate multimedia resources like videos or podcasts discussing Elizabethan beliefs in astrology to broaden contextual awareness.
