# **Core Skills Analysis**

## Early Literacy and Language Development

## Tips

To extend Oliver, Mila, and Reggie's learning from the Gruffalow puzzle, consider integrating storytelling activities where they recreate or retell parts of 'The Gruffalo' story in their own words or through drawings. Incorporate sensory play by creating textures related to the puzzle scenes, such as leaves or animal fur, to deepen engagement. Engage the children in a nature walk to find elements similar to those featured in the story, enhancing real-world connection. Finally, encourage cooperative puzzle building to build communication and social skills further, perhaps introducing puzzles with increasing complexity or complementary themed games.
