### English

### Tips

To deepen engagement with Musical Theatre inspired by SpongeBob the Musical, encourage B to write a short script or scene continuing the story or exploring a minor character's perspective. This fosters creativity and narrative skills. Incorporate music composition by having B create simple melodies or rhythms aligned with the mood of scenes to blend mathematical timing with artistic expression. Physical creativity can be sparked through choreography sessions mimicking the musical's dances, reinforcing kinesthetic learning and body awareness. Finally, attending live or recorded performances enables analysis of professional stagecraft, broadening appreciation and critical thinking about theatre arts.
