## **Core Skills Analysis**

#### **Social Studies**

- Recognized Alabama as one of the 50 United States and placed it correctly on a map or in a travel-the-states worksheet.
- Identified Alabama's official symbols—the Northern Flicker (state bird), the Camellia (state flower), and the Longleaf Pine (state tree) and could name each.
- Connected the symbols to Alabama's natural environment, learning how the bird, flower, and tree reflect the state's climate and culture.
- Practiced basic research skills by reading a passage about Alanna in the 50 States book and extracting key factual details.

# **Tips**

Extend the Alabama adventure by turning the state symbols into a mini-exhibit at home: let your child create a "State Museum" display with drawings, photos, and a short oral presentation about why each symbol matters to Alabama. Next, compare Alabama to another state they've studied—use a Venn diagram to highlight similarities and differences in geography, climate, and symbols. Finally, plan a virtual field trip to an Alabama park or wildlife sanctuary (many offer free live cams) so the child can observe a real Northern Flicker or Longleaf Pine and relate the experience back to the symbols they colored.
