# Activity: "Playing with cars"

## Math

- The child can learn about counting by counting the number of cars in a collection.
- They can practice sorting and classifying cars based on attributes such as color, size, or type.

## Music

Additionally, introducing the child to real-life experiences related to cars, such as visiting a car museum or attending a car race, can further deepen their understanding and interest in the subject.
