- The Eighth-grade child practiced their vocabulary skills by trying to describe a word without using specific "taboo" words.
- They developed their communication skills by using alternative words and expressions to convey their intended meaning.

- They enhanced their listening skills by paying close attention to the words and clues provided by their teammates in order to guess the correct word.
