## **Physical Education**

- The Eighth-grade child has learned about agility and coordination through the fast-paced movements and dodging in the game.
- Gorilla tag has helped improve the Eighth-grade child's physical fitness and cardiovascular endurance through running and leaping.
- The activity has also taught the child about teamwork and communication skills in strategizing and working together as a team to catch or escape from the gorillas.
- Gorilla tag has provided the child with an opportunity to practice fair play and good sportsmanship.

## **Social Studies**

- The game has offered insights into the behavior and social structure of gorillas, allowing the Eighth-grade child to understand primate societies in a hands-on way.
- Gorilla tag has also highlighted the concept of adaptation as the child must adapt their strategy and movements to the changing environment and conditions of the game.
- The game's setting in a jungle environment can spark curiosity and interest in geography, ecosystems, and wildlife conservation.

For continued development related to the activity, the Eighth-grade child can explore creating their own versions of gorilla tag to incorporate elements of different subjects. For example, they can design a version of the game that includes questions related to social studies, or they could create a map or diagram of the game environment as a geography project.
