My child went to the first day of theater rehearsal and played acting games and then broke into two groups to start practicing lines (they got a speaking role) and learning the songs / Subject Explorer / LearningCorner.co

Art

- Theater rehearsal introduced the concept of expression through performance and use of body language.
- The student learned about stage presence, how to use props, and costume design as part of their role-playing activities.
- Through singing and acting, the child developed creativity and imagination, as well as an understanding of performance as an art form.

English

- Theater activities promoted teamwork, cooperation, and communication with peers, fostering essential social skills and empathy for different characters and their backgrounds.

Continued development can include encouraging the child to write and create their own mini-plays, allowing them to take on the role of playwright and director. This can enhance their understanding of storytelling, character development, and the structure of performances. Introducing them to famous plays and musicals can further expand their understanding of theater history and different cultural contexts, allowing for deeper exploration and appreciation of the subject.
