For example, in the sentence 'The happy dog chased the ball,' 'dog' and 'ball' are nouns because they are naming the animals and objects in the sentence.

Nouns can be common, like 'book' or 'tree,' which are things we see every day. Proper nouns, on the other hand, are specific names of people, places, or things, like 'Sarah' or 'Paris.'

Nouns can also be countable, meaning we can easily count them, such as 'three apples,' or uncountable, like 'water' or 'love,' which cannot be counted.
