

Understanding Present Perfect Tense

The present perfect tense is a way to talk about things that have happened at some point in the past but are still relevant or important now. Let's break it down with some simple explanations and pictures!

What is Present Perfect Tense?

In English, we create the present perfect tense using the auxiliary verb **'have'** or **'has'** and the past participle of the main verb. It looks like this:

have/has + past participle

When Do We Use It?

- **Completed Actions with Relevance to Now:**
Example: **I have eaten lunch.**

- **Continuing Actions:**



"They have lived here for 5 years."

- **Recent Actions:**



"We have just finished our homework."
