## Objective

The objective of this lesson is for the student to create a list of 15 words that have corresponding antonyms, enhancing their vocabulary and understanding of word relationships.

## **Materials and Prep**

- Paper
- Pencil or pen

No specific prior knowledge is required for this lesson.

## Activities

- Brainstorming: Have the student brainstorm as many words as they can think of that have antonyms. Encourage them to think of different word categories such as adjectives, verbs, and nouns.

## **Talking Points**

- "Now, I'm going to give you a list of words, and I want you to match each word with its corresponding antonym. Take your time and think carefully."
- "Writing sentences using antonyms will help us see how these words can be used in different contexts. Try to create meaningful and grammatically correct sentences."
- "Remember, learning new words and their antonyms will not only expand your vocabulary but also enhance your overall communication skills."
