

Objective

By the end of this lesson, the student will be able to understand and use basic American Sign Language (ASL) signs, including greetings, common phrases, and the alphabet. The student will also gain an appreciation for Deaf culture and the importance of communication accessibility.

Materials and Prep

- None required; the lesson will utilize the student's hands and body for signing.
