Objective

By the end of this lesson, the student will create a visual representation of a scene or character from "A Wrinkle In Time," enhancing their understanding of the book's themes and characters through artistic expression.

Materials and Prep

- Paper (any type)
- Pencils, markers, or crayons
- Optional: A ruler for straight lines
- A copy of "A Wrinkle In Time" (or access to key passages)
- Space to work comfortably

Before starting, familiarize yourself with key scenes or characters from the book. Think about the emotions and themes you want to convey through your art.

Activities

- **Character Portraits:** Choose a character from "A Wrinkle In Time" and create a detailed portrait. Think about how their personality is reflected in their appearance and what colors might represent their traits.
- **Scene Illustration:** Pick a significant scene from the book and illustrate it. Focus on capturing the mood and action of the moment. Consider how you can use colors and shapes to express feelings.
- **Theme Collage:** Create a collage that represents the main themes of the book, such as love, courage, or the battle between good and evil. Use drawings, words, and symbols to convey these ideas visually.
- **Story Map:** Draw a map that illustrates the different worlds and locations mentioned in "A Wrinkle In Time." Label each area and include key events that happen there.

Talking Points

- "What do you think makes Meg Murry a unique character? How can we show that in your portrait?"
- "Can you describe the mood of the scene you want to illustrate? What colors do you think will help express that mood?"
- "What themes do you think are the most important in the story? How can we represent them visually in your collage?"
- "Why do you think the author chose to create different worlds? What do you want to include in your story map to show these places?"
