

Objective

By the end of this lesson, the student will have a deeper understanding of Medieval times, including its social structure, daily life, and significant events. The student will also engage in creative activities that help reinforce their learning about this fascinating period in history.

Materials and Prep

- Paper and pencils for writing and drawing
- Colored markers or crayons for illustrations
- A timer or clock to keep track of activity durations
- A comfortable space to work and create

Activities

Talking Points
