Objective

By the end of this lesson, Kaeleb will have a deeper understanding of the themes, characters, and plot of "A Wrinkle in Time." He will create a creative book report that showcases his insights and encourages him to think critically about the story.

Materials and Prep

- Copy of "A Wrinkle in Time" by Madeleine L'Engle
- Pencil and paper for notes and the book report
- Colored pencils or markers for illustrations
- · Access to a quiet space for reading and writing
- Timer (optional, for timed activities)

Activities

• Reading Time:

Start by reading a chapter or two of "A Wrinkle in Time." Encourage Kaeleb to take notes on key characters, events, and his thoughts as he reads.

• Character Mapping:

Create a character map for the main characters in the book. Kaeleb can draw pictures or use words to describe their traits, motivations, and relationships to each other.

• Theme Exploration:

Talking Points

- "Why do you think the author chose to include Mrs. Whatsit, Mrs. Which, and Mrs. Who? What do they teach us?"
- "What role does love play in the story? Can you find examples where love overcomes challenges?"
- "How do you feel about the ending of the book? What message do you think the author wanted to convey?"
