Objective

By the end of this lesson, Noah will have a deeper understanding of the themes, characters, and cultural references in the Stranger Things series. He will explore various subjects such as science, friendship, and the 1980s pop culture, while engaging in creative activities that connect these topics.

Materials and Prep

- "How do the characters grow throughout the series? What lessons do you think they learn?"
- "Why do you think people enjoy watching shows about supernatural events? What do you find appealing about it?"

- "If you had to choose one episode to watch again, which would it be and why?"
- "What have you learned about storytelling through this series? How can you apply that to your own writing?"
