

## Objective

By the end of this lesson, the student will be able to understand and appreciate the role of feminism in visual arts, and identify key feminist artists and their works.

## Materials and Prep

- Internet access
- Pen and paper

No prior knowledge is required for this lesson.

## Activities

1. **Research:** Begin by researching the history and significance of feminism in the visual arts. Use online resources or books to gather information on key feminist artists, their works, and the impact they have made.
2. **Art Analysis:** Choose one or more artworks created by feminist artists. Analyze the chosen artworks by considering the use of symbolism, color, composition, and subject matter. Take notes on your observations.
3. **Reflection:** Write a short reflection on how the chosen artworks reflect feminist themes and ideas. Consider the artist's intentions and the message conveyed through the artwork. Share your thoughts on the importance of feminism in the visual arts.
4. **Art Creation:** Create your own artwork that expresses a feminist message or theme. Use any medium or materials you have available. Think about the concepts and ideas you have learned about feminism in visual arts and incorporate them into your artwork.
