## **Objective**

By the end of this lesson, the student will understand the concept of sending and receiving messages, using fun examples and activities to engage their curiosity and imagination.

### **Materials and Prep**

- No materials are needed for this lesson.
- Prepare to explain the concept of messages in a simple way.
- Think of fun examples of how we send and receive messages in everyday life.

### **Activities**

#### • Message Relay Game:

Play a game where you and the student pass messages to each other using simple words or phrases. For example, whisper a message and see if they can repeat it correctly!

#### • Draw a Message:

Have the student draw a picture that represents a message they want to send. They can explain what their drawing means, just like sending a message!

#### • Story Time:

Read a short story where characters send messages to each other. After reading, discuss how the characters communicated.

#### Make a Message Bottle:

Pretend to send a message in a bottle. The student can write a short note on paper, roll it up, and put it in a bottle. Talk about where the message might go!

# **Talking Points**

- "Do you know what a message is? It's like a note we send to someone!"
- "When we talk or write, we are sending messages to our friends and family!"
- "What do you think happens when we send a message? Someone has to receive it!"
- "Just like in our game, we can send messages in different ways, like whispering or drawing!"
