Objective

By the end of this lesson, the student will create a project that explores themes, characters, and moral lessons from the TV series "Supernatural," while also connecting them to elements of the national curriculum such as storytelling, character analysis, and ethical reasoning.

Materials and Prep

- Notebook or sketchbook for notes and drawings
- Pens, pencils, and colored markers
- Access to episodes of "Supernatural" for reference (if possible)
- Internet access for research on folklore and mythology (if possible)

Before the lesson, it would be helpful for the student to have watched a few episodes of "Supernatural" to be familiar with the characters and storylines. Understanding basic themes like family, sacrifice, and good vs. evil will enhance their project.

Activities

Character Profiles:

Create detailed profiles for key characters like Sam and Dean Winchester. Include their backgrounds, motivations, and how they change throughout the series. This will help the student understand character development.

• Theme Exploration:

Choose a few major themes from the show, such as friendship, loyalty, and the battle between good and evil. The student can write a short essay or create a visual presentation explaining how these themes are represented in different episodes.

• Folklore Research:

Investigate the real-life folklore and myths that inspired various episodes of "Supernatural." The student can create a mini-book or poster that showcases these myths, explaining their origins and how they relate to the show.

Creative Writing:

Write a short story or script featuring the characters from "Supernatural." The story can involve an original monster or supernatural event. This will encourage creativity and narrative skills.

Talking Points

- "What are some of the main themes in 'Supernatural'? Can you think of examples from the show?"
- "How do Sam and Dean's personalities complement each other? Why do you think they make such a great team?"
- "Can you name some real-life myths or legends that were used in the show? How do they compare to what you see in 'Supernatural'?"
- "What moral lessons can we learn from the characters' choices? Do you think they always make the right decisions?"
- "How does the show portray the concept of family? Why is family important in the series?"
