Objective

By the end of this lesson, Heidi will be able to identify and describe various landscapes in Australia and their distinctive landform features, including deserts, mountains, and coastal areas. She will also develop her English language skills through writing and presenting her findings.

Materials and Prep

- · Notebook and pen for note-taking
- Colored pencils or markers for drawing
- Access to a computer or tablet for research (if available)
- Printed maps of Australia (if available)

Activities

- "Indigenous Australians have a deep connection to the land. Why do you think understanding their perspective is important?"

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- "Climate change is affecting landscapes around the world. What changes do you think might happen to Australia's landscapes?"
- "Exploring different landscapes can inspire creativity. How can nature influence art and storytelling?"
- "What did you find most interesting about the landscape you researched? Why?"
- "How can we protect and preserve these unique landscapes for future generations?"
- "What is one thing you would like to learn more about regarding Australian landscapes?"
