

Objective

By the end of this lesson, the student will have a deeper understanding of the Protestant Reformation and its impact on medieval Catholicism, including key figures, events, and theological differences. The student will also explore how these historical developments shaped modern Christianity and continue to influence religious thought today.

Materials and Prep

- Notebook and pen for taking notes
- Access to a computer or tablet for research (if available)
- Printed timeline of the Protestant Reformation (can be created beforehand)
- List of key figures and events in the Protestant Reformation
- Access to a dictionary or thesaurus for vocabulary building

Activities

- **Timeline Creation:** The student will create a timeline of key events during the Protestant Reformation, marking significant dates and figures. This visual representation will help them understand the chronological flow of events and their interconnections.
- **Character Exploration:** The student will choose a key figure from the Protestant Reformation (e.g., Martin Luther, John Calvin, or Henry VIII) and prepare a short presentation about their life, beliefs, and impact on the Church. This activity encourages research and presentation skills.
- **Debate on Theological Differences:** The student will engage in a friendly debate on a major theological difference between Protestantism and Catholicism, such as the authority of Scripture versus Church tradition. This will help them articulate their thoughts and understand differing perspectives.
- **Creative Reflection:** The student will write a short reflective piece or a fictional dialogue between a Protestant reformer and a medieval Catholic cleric. This will allow them to creatively explore the tensions and conversations of the time.
