- **Ragnarok:** The foretold end of the world, a cosmic battle leading to rebirth.

Activity: Quick Fire Questions! I'll throw out some names or concepts, and you tell me one thing you remember or find interesting about them.

Part 2: Choose Your Legend - Selecting a Myth (15-20 minutes)

There are SO many incredible stories. Let's look at a few options you could explore for your essay. Think about which one sparks your interest the most! Here are a few ideas (we can look up summaries together):

- The Binding of Fenrir: How the gods tricked the mighty wolf.
- Thor's Journey to Utgard-Loki: Where Thor is outwitted by a giant king's illusions.
- The Death of Baldr: Loki's role in the demise of the most beloved god.
- Loki's Children: The monstrous offspring of Loki and their significance.
- How Odin Lost His Eye: A tale of sacrifice for wisdom.

Your Task: Choose ONE myth (or a specific character within a myth) that you'd like to focus on for your essay.

Part 3: Forging Your Argument - The Essay Quest (15

minutes)

An essay is like a well-argued quest! You need a clear goal (your main point) and evidence to support it. For your essay, you could:

- **Analyze a Character:** What are their motivations? Strengths? Weaknesses? How do they impact the story? (e.g., "Loki's character in 'The Death of Baldr' shows the destructive power of envy.")
- **Explore a Theme:** What's a big idea the myth explores? (e.g., "The myth of 'The Binding of Fenrir' explores the theme of fear versus fate.")
- **Examine a Conflict:** What is the central struggle in the myth and what does it reveal? (e.g., "Thor's conflict with Jörmungandr represents the constant struggle between order and chaos in Norse cosmology.")

Your Task: Based on your chosen myth, what kind of essay question would you like to answer? What do you want to argue or explain?

Part 4: The Map to Your Treasure - Thesis Statement & Outline (25-30 minutes)

Every great adventurer needs a map! For our essay, our map starts with a **thesis statement** and an **outline**.

Thesis Statement: This is ONE sentence that clearly states the main argument or point of your essay. It usually comes at the end of your introduction.

Example if exploring Loki in The Death of Baldr: "Through his cunning manipulation and deep-seated jealousy, Loki's actions in the death of Baldr serve as the critical catalyst that hastens the arrival of Ragnarok, showcasing the powerful consequences of uncontrolled malice in Norse mythology."

Your Task 1: Let's brainstorm some ideas for your thesis statement based on your chosen myth and question.

Essay Outline (A Simple Structure):

- 1. Introduction:**
 - Hook (grab the reader's attention – maybe a cool fact about Norse myths or your chosen character).
 - Brief background on the myth/character.
 - Your THESIS STATEMENT.
- 2. Body Paragraph 1:**
 - Topic sentence (main point for this paragraph, supports your thesis).
 - Evidence from the myth (a specific event, quote, or description).
 - Explanation (how does this evidence prove your point?).
- 3. Body Paragraph 2 (and 3, if needed):**
 - Same structure as above, but with a new point and new evidence.
- 4. Conclusion:**
 - Restate your thesis (in different words).
 - Briefly summarize your main points.
 - A final thought-provoking sentence (the "so what?" factor).

Your Task 2: Let's create a basic outline for YOUR essay using this structure.

Part 5: The Scribe's Work - Begin Drafting! (30-45 minutes)

Now it's time to start writing! Don't worry about making it perfect in the first go. This is your 'first draft' – the goal is to get your ideas down based on your outline. Focus on one section at a time.
