- **Fuzzy and Grippy:** They have thick, woolly fur to protect them from heat and cold, and also to provide some cushioning when they sit in trees. They have two opposable thumbs on their front paws and strong claws, perfect for gripping branches.
- **Noisy Critters:** Despite looking cute, male koalas can make a very loud bellowing sound to communicate, especially during mating season.

Why Are Eucalyptus Trees So Important?

Eucalyptus trees are a koala's lifeline! Without them, koalas wouldn't have:

- **Food:** Their primary food source.
- **Shelter:** A safe place to rest, sleep, and raise their young.
- **Water:** Koalas get most of their water from the moisture in eucalyptus leaves.

Unfortunately, koala habitats are sometimes threatened by things like deforestation (cutting down trees) and bushfires. That's why conservation efforts are so important to protect these special animals.

Fun Koala Facts Roundup!

- A baby koala (joey) is born blind, hairless, and only about the size of a jellybean! It crawls into its mother's pouch immediately after birth.
- Koalas have fingerprints, just like humans! And they are so similar that it can be hard to tell them apart even under a microscope.
- The word "koala" is thought to come from an Aboriginal word meaning "no drink" because they get most of their water from leaves.
