Wacky Wonders: Creating Your Own Dr. Seuss Character and Story!

Materials You'll Need:

- A selection of your favorite Dr. Seuss books (e.g., "The Cat in the Hat," "Green Eggs and Ham," "Oh, the Places You'll Go!")
- Large plain paper or a sketchbook
- Crayons, colored pencils, or markers
- Pencil and eraser
- Optional fun bits: Googly eyes, colorful yarn, scraps of construction paper, glue stick (for extra character flair!)

Let's Get Seussical! (Lesson Steps)

Part 1: Dive into the World of Rhyme! (Approx. 15-20 minutes)

Hello Seuss Explorer! Today, we're going on an adventure into the amazing, rhyming world of Dr. Seuss, and then we're going to make our VERY OWN Seuss-tastic creations!

- 1. **Read Aloud Fun:** Let's pick one or two Dr. Seuss books. As we read, listen closely for all the silly, funny words that sound alike those are rhymes! Can you clap when you hear a rhyme? (*Teacher/Parent: Read with enthusiasm, emphasizing rhymes.*)
- 2. **Rhyme Spotting:** After reading a page or two, let's talk about the rhymes we found. For example, "hat" and "cat," or "mouse" and "house."
- 3. **Silly Rhyme Challenge:** Now, let's make up our own! I'll say a word, and you try to think of a silly, made-up word that rhymes with it.
 - What rhymes with "blue"? (Maybe "gloo-gloo" or "floofloo"?)
 - What rhymes with "tree"? (How about "squee" or "ziggity-zee"?)
 - What rhymes with "star"? (Perhaps "flamar" or "zing-zar"?)

Let's try to come up with three new rhyming pairs!

Part 2: Invent Your Wacky Character! (Approx. 20-30 minutes)

Dr. Seuss made so many strange and wonderful characters, like the Lorax, the Grinch, and Horton the Elephant! Now it's YOUR turn to invent a brand new one!

- 1. Character Brainstorm: What could your character look like?
 - Does it have long legs or short legs? Or maybe lots of legs? Or no legs at all?
 - $\circ\,$ What color is it? Is it stripy, spotty, or all one color?
 - Does it have fur, feathers, scales, or something else entirely?
 - What kind of nose, eyes, and mouth does it have? Are they big or small, silly or serious?
 - What's a funny, Seuss-like name for your character? (e.g., The Floof, a Zizzle-Zonk, Professor McFibble)
- 2. **Draw Your Character:** Take your paper and drawing tools. Let your imagination run wild! Draw your character. Don't worry about it being perfect; Dr. Seuss's characters are all about being unique and fun! (*Teacher/Parent: Encourage creativity and unique features. If using optional craft supplies, this is the time to add them.*)
- 3. **Tell Me About Your Character:** Once your drawing is done, tell me all about your character.
 - $\circ~$ What is its name?
 - What does it like to do?
 - What sound does it make?
 - $\circ\,$ What makes it special or silly?

Part 3: A Little Seuss Story! (Approx. 10-15 minutes)

Every great character needs a little story, even if it's just a tiny one! Let's try to make a short, rhyming sentence or two about your new friend.

- 1. Sentence Starters: Think about your character.
 - "My [Character's Name] is so [adjective], it loves to [verb] all [time of day/place]."
 "The [Character's Name] with the [feature] nose, went walking on its [type of] toes."
- 2. Rhyme It Up!: Let's try to make it rhyme! For example, if your character is a "Floof" who is "blue," maybe "My Floof so blue, loves to drink morning dew!" (*Teacher/Parent: Help the* student form a rhyming sentence or two. They can dictate, and you can write it down for them, or they can try to write parts of it.)

Part 4: Show Off Your Seuss-sation! (5 minutes)

It's time to shine! Present your amazing character drawing and read (or have read) your little Seuss story. Be proud of your wonderful, wacky creation!
