Objective

By the end of this lesson, you will be able to identify and locate various countries around the world that have a strong basketball culture.

Materials and Prep

- World map or globe
- Pen or pencil
- Internet access (optional)

Prior knowledge of basic geography and basketball is helpful but not required.

Activities

- 1. Begin by discussing with the student the popularity of basketball as a sport worldwide. Ask them to name a few countries known for their basketball culture.
- 2. Show the student a world map or globe and ask them to locate the United States, the birthplace of basketball. Discuss the history and development of the sport in the U.S.
- 3. Next, ask the student to identify and locate other countries known for their basketball prowess. Encourage them to think beyond the NBA and consider international competitions such as the Olympics and FIBA World Cup.
- 4. Discuss the impact of basketball on these countries in terms of culture, economy, and national pride. Ask the student to share any interesting facts they may know about basketball in different countries.
- 5. If internet access is available, allow the student to research and present a short report on a specific country with a strong basketball culture. This can be done in a subsequent lesson.

Ninth Grade Talking Points

- "Basketball is not just popular in the United States, but also in many other countries around the world."
- "The United States is considered the birthplace of basketball, and it has had a significant influence on the sport's global development."
- "Countries like Spain, Serbia, Lithuania, and Argentina have produced many talented basketball players and have strong basketball traditions."
- "Basketball has become a global phenomenon, with international competitions like the Olympics and FIBA World Cup showcasing the sport's popularity and bringing nations together."
- "The impact of basketball extends beyond the court, as it influences culture, economy, and national pride in countries with a strong basketball culture."
