Objective

- Internet access for research

Activities

- 1. Research: Use the internet to find information about hummingbirds. Look for facts about their size, color, diet, and habitat.
- 2. Note-taking: Write down at least three interesting facts you learned about hummingbirds.
- 3. Drawing: Create a colorful drawing of a hummingbird. Pay attention to their unique features, such as long beaks and vibrant feathers.
- 4. Observation: Find a comfortable spot outside and spend some time observing your surroundings. Look for any hummingbirds or other birds you may see. Take note of their behavior and movements.
- 5. Reflection: Write or draw about your observations. What did you notice about the hummingbirds? How do you think they contribute to the ecosystem?
