Objective

By the end of this lesson, you will be able to analyze and write about the book "Diary of a Wimpy Kid" by Jeff Kinney.

Materials and Prep

- Copy of "Diary of a Wimpy Kid" by Jeff Kinney
- Pen or pencil
- Notebook or paper

Activities
