Objective

By the end of this lesson, you will be able to understand the history of Christopher Columbus and the pilgrims.

Materials and Prep

- Pen or pencil
- Blank paper or notebook
- Access to the internet or library resources
- Optional: Art supplies for a creative activity

Before starting the lesson, make sure you have some basic knowledge about Christopher Columbus and the pilgrims. You can search for information online or find books in your local library.

Activities

 - Write and perform a short skit about an encounter between Christopher Columbus and a Native American.
