Objective

By the end of this lesson, you will be able to use your Hot wheels track building skills to create a story and describe it using language arts and reading concepts.

Materials and Prep

- Hot wheels tracks
- Hot wheels cars
- Construction paper
- Markers or crayons
- Scissors
- Tape or glue

Before starting this lesson, make sure you have a basic understanding of the different parts of a story, such as characters, setting, and plot.

Activities

- 1. Build a Hot wheels track using the tracks and cars you have. Make it as long and exciting as you can!
- 2. Once you have built your track, think of a story that could happen on this track. It could involve the Hot wheels cars or any other characters you like.
- 3. Use the construction paper, markers or crayons, and scissors to create a backdrop for your story. Draw and cut out different scenes or settings that your story will take place in.
- 4. Arrange your scenes along the Hot wheels track to match the different parts of your story. You can use tape or glue to secure them in place.
- 5. Now, tell your story out loud as you guide the Hot wheels cars along the track. Use descriptive words and phrases to make your story more interesting.

Preschool Grade Talking Points

- "A story is like a make-believe adventure that we can create using our imagination."
- "We can use our Hot wheels tracks and cars to make our own stories."
- "Characters are the people or things in a story. They can be the Hot wheels cars or any other toys you like."
- "The setting is where the story takes place. We can create different settings using the construction paper and markers."
- "The plot is what happens in the story. It can be about a race, a rescue mission, or anything you can think of!"
- "We can use words and phrases to describe what is happening in our story. This makes it more interesting for others to listen to."
