Objective

By the end of this lesson, the student will have gained a deeper understanding of Roman gladiators and their significance in ancient Roman society.

Materials and Prep

- Internet access
- Pen and paper

No prior knowledge is required for this lesson.

Activities

- **Research Roman Gladiators:** Encourage the student to use the internet to research and gather information about Roman gladiators. They can take notes on interesting facts, types of gladiators, and their roles in society.
- Create a Gladiator Collage: Provide the student with magazines or printed images of gladiators. They can cut out and arrange the images on a piece of paper to create a collage representing different types of gladiators.

Talking Points
