Objective

Materials and Prep

Activities

- Research different horse breeds and create a poster or presentation showcasing their unique features.

Talking Points

- **Horse care:** "Taking care of a horse involves feeding them nutritious food, providing clean water, grooming their coat, and ensuring they have enough exercise. It's important to treat horses with kindness and respect."
